What Does Anthropology Study?

Anthropology studies human beings across time and space.

It seeks to understand:



Where humans come from



How societies developed



How people create meaning in different cultures



How humans adapt to changing environments



The Four Main Fields

Anthropology is traditionally divided into four main fields:



Together, these fields give us a complete picture of what it means to be human.



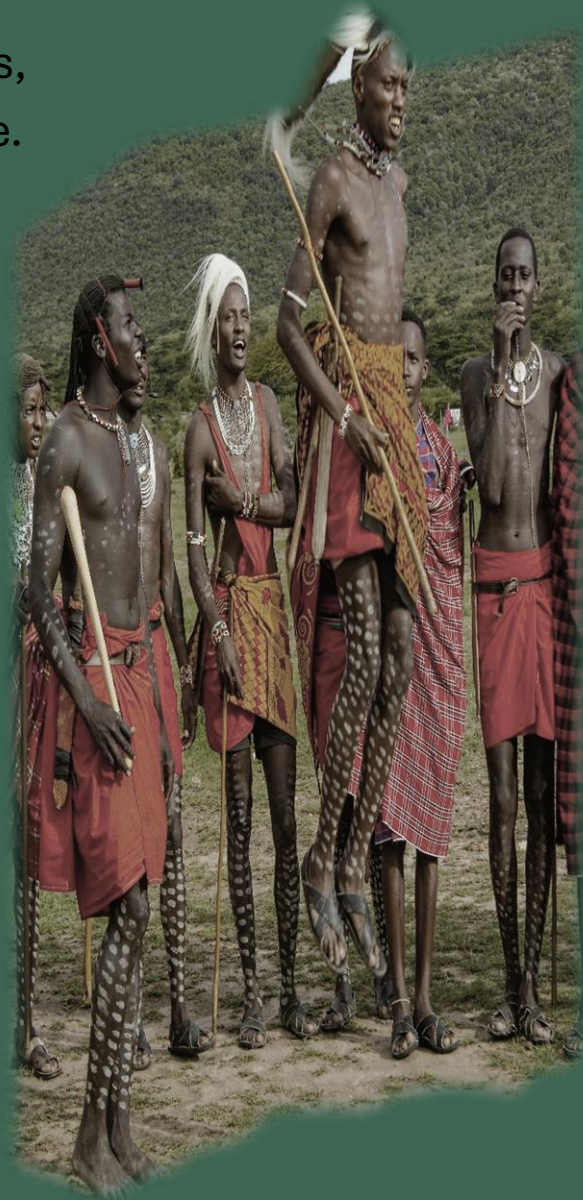
Cultural Anthropology

Cultural Anthropologists study the beliefs, customs, values, and social life of people.

They Explore:

- Family life
- Religion
- Gender
- Politics
- Identity
- Rituals
- Art and Symbols

Their goal is understanding how people make sense of the world around them.





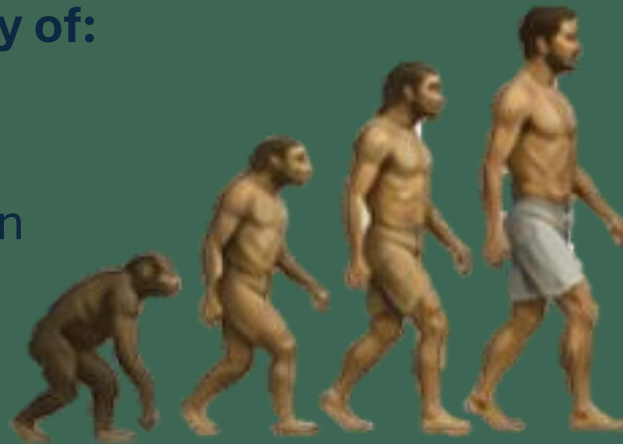
Biological
Anthropology

Biological Anthropology

This field explores the biological aspects of human beings.

It includes the study of:

- Human Evolution
- Fossils
- Genetics
- Primates
- Human Adaptation



Questions include:

- Why are humans unique?
- How did our species evolve?
- How do we adapt to different environments?



Archaeology

Archaeologists study past societies through the material remains they left behind.

The examine:

- Ancient Cities
- Pottery
- Tools
- Graves
- Buildings
- Artifacts

Objects and Sites help us reconstruct how people lived in the past.





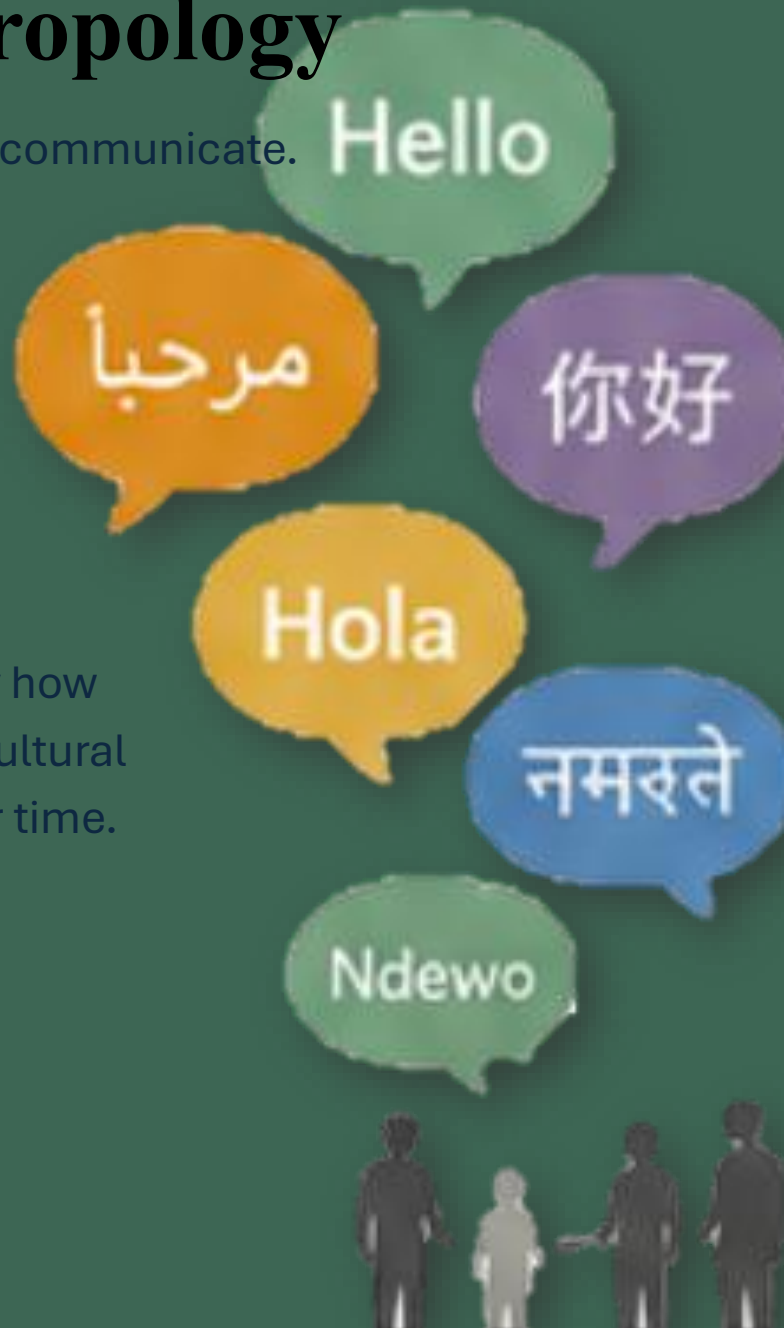
Linguistic Anthropology

Language is more than a way to communicate.

It shapes:

- Identity
- Relationships
- Power
- Culture
- Worldviews

Linguistic anthropologists study how language is used in social and cultural context and how it changes over time.





How Anthropologists Conduct Research

The most well-known method is **ethnography**.

Researchers spend time with communities to:

- Observe
- Participate
- Interview
- Record Experiences
- Understand daily life from the inside. (From culture's own perspective)

Ethnography helps build deep and respectful understanding.

Why We Need Anthropology Now More Than Ever?

It bridges and widens our understanding by enabling us to:

- Appreciate diversity and cultural differences.

- Improve communication across cultures.
- Address social challenges like inequality, discrimination, and conflict.
- Avoid ethnocentric views.

- **Language:** A system of communication through which people express ideas, emotions, and cultural knowledge.
- **Artifact:** An object used or made by humans that provide information about a culture or society.
- **Human Evolution:** The biological process through which modern humans developed over millions of years.
- **Ethnocentrism:** the tendency to judge other cultures using the standards of one's own culture.
- **Participant observation:** A research method in which anthropologists take part in daily activities while observing social life.
